



Cruisers & Trawler Yachts

The 30' Beaching Cruiser (above left) has shoal draft for cruising in thin water. Her accommodations work well for weekend or vacation use for a couple, with perhaps a couple small kids.

The 27 1/2' Trawler Yacht (above right) would work well as a liveaboard for a young couple or a singlehander. The foc'sle has a nice double berth and there is plenty of room in the great cabin for social gatherings. Her steadying sail rig will ease the motion in a beam or following sea. There is a cargo hold area under the waist deck, for storing out-of-season clothes, extra stores, or that special piece salvaged or beachcombed on the last cruise.

The 36' Cruiser (below left) is designed for operating at semi-displacement speeds. She has a tri-cabin layout, with most of the accommodations all on one level, with only the foc'sle stateroom being down a couple of steps. (This sort of layout is increasingly popular as we get older and don't want to or can't handle a lot of

climbing, yet don't want to give up cruising.) There are port and starboard recessed ladders to the boat deck, which has room for a large dinghy and plenty of seating. The flying bridge controls will be a popular place in good weather and it's extra height will be useful in making landfall in a new harbor.

The 39' Cruiser is a modification of the 36-footer, with a double chine form added to make the walkaround side decks a more useful width and a raking stem for longer length. There is also an enclosure for the forward head and a sink has been added there.
